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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

HPT Arts and RYK Science College, founded in 1924 by **Principal T.A. Kulkarni** under the aegis of **Gokhale Education Society**, has been a beacon of academic excellence in Nashik and North Maharashtra for a century. Begun as an Arts College, it now offers a diverse range of Arts and Science programmes. Older than S.P. Pune University, its centenary is a testament of its commitment to quality education. Governed by the Gokhale Education Society, the College maintains a politically neutral, achievement-oriented environment, featuring 21 academic departments and 07 research centers, alongside 07 programmes and 46 courses at undergraduate, postgraduate, and research levels. College aims at holistic student development—intellectually, emotionally, socially, and professionally—equipping them to contribute meaningfully to a technologically advanced and scientifically driven society.

Its 18 acre campus in Nashik provides a serene learning environment with adequate resources, including equipped laboratories, library with 1.25 lakhs books, seminar halls, playfield, and hostels. Additionally, College preserves Indian heritage through a collection of 1900 ancient manuscripts. Renowned for its research culture, the College faculty has published 214 research papers, filed 4 patents and secured grants of Rs. 89,40,450 in last 5 years, while also involving over 500 students in OJT and research projects. Faculty members are actively contributing at university and management, through BoS, other committees and as Life Members. College is actively involved in understanding and implementing NEP-2020.

College administration is transparent, decentralized, encouraging and participative decision-making is implementated through committees and Branch Council. Proactive IQAC fosters the development of both staff and students. With ISO 9001-2018 certification and NAAC A-grade, College exemplifies academic excellence and inclusivity of students, including divyang. It is engaged with community through blood donation camps, **Socio-Scientific exhibition**, *Amhi-Jijau,Savitrichya Leki* and other initiatives. Our students have excelled in sports, cultural events and consistently achieved top rankings in university examinations. Emphasizing student support, College provides placement oportunities, counselling, and secures campus with CCTV surveillance. Effective implementation of this process is ensured through Lecture Monitoring Committee, ISO Audit and AAA regularly. Observations of Lecture Monitoring Committee is shared with staff members. Principal, Vice-Principals and Discipline Committee take care of maintaining congenial atmosphere for academic activities. **Staff Training Academy** of Gokhale Education Society (parent institute) and **Pradhyapak Prabodhini** take special efforts to improve TLE process by conducting orientation/training programmes and our College staff is benefitted from them.

College offers good academic flexibility to students via the choice-based credits in every subject. College conducted **28 add-on/certificate courses** through a very well-defined admission, evaluation and documentation process benefitting **5354 students**. Curriculum enrichment is ensured by effective implementation of **project work in 18 different subjects** and **fieldwork in 3 subjects**. This includes participation of 267 students in applied research projects and 233 students in fieldwork. Students are also encouraged to attend **MOOC courses and 18 students** have taken benefit of them. In addition, teachers encourage students to participate in seminars, workshops and conferences to complement their syllabus and classroom teaching. Our **5 teachers** have worked on BoS and played significant role in syllabus designing. Our staff members have designed syllabi for 28 add-on courses.

The curriculum enrichment, flexibility and implementation are ensured by a wholesome feedback system, wherein the feedback regarding syllabus from students and teachers is collected, analysed, action taken report prepared and communicated to the relevant bodies. Feedback is hosted on the institutional website and is available for everyone to read and reflect. Main focus of the College has always been on the academic and allied activities. A tradition of excellent results (above 85% for UG-PG) and **88 students featuring in the University list** in last 5 years is a testimony of effectiveness of our Curricular Planning and Implementation policies.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution places a significant emphasis on student enrollment and inclusivity in undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) programs, especially for reserved categories. For the Assessment period 2018-2023, the average enrolment percentage is **85.47**. The average total enrolment is **3107** whereas average first year enrolment is **1395** in five years. Over the years, the institution has effectively managed its sanctioned seats for reserved categories, averaging around **99.01%**, highlighting its accessibility to students. The College has maintained the student-teacher ratio at **23:1**.

The institution's robust teaching-learning and evaluation framework is aligned with quality education goals and a strong commitment to inclusivity. The data reflects this commitment, with the institution maintaining an average of **78.99** % of faculty positions filled over five years .

Student performance metrics underscore the effectiveness of our teaching-learning methodologies. The average pass percentage over five years is an impressive **87.68%**, indicating solid academic outcomes. Notably, the 2020-21 academic year marked the highest pass rate of **95.35%**, showcasing our institution's adaptability and dedication amidst challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic. This adaptability reassures our resilience and commitment to academic excellence.

Professional development among faculty is emphasised, with an average of 75% of staff holding qualifications such as NET/SET, Ph.D, or M.Phil. reinforcing the delivery of high-quality education.

Regular assessments and transparent evaluation processes further ensure the integrity of the academic ecosystem. The institution integrates innovative pedagogical practices like experiential, participative, problemsolving and ICT enabled learning methodologies. It emphasizes outcome-based education, catering to diverse learner needs. This approach fosters critical thinking, analytical skills, and research aptitude, preparing students for higher education and professional pursuits. The institution's teaching-learning and evaluation strategies demonstrate its dedication to academic excellence and holistic student development.

The College has developed robust mapping of Course Outcomes (COs) and Programme Outcomes (POs) through direct and indirect methods. Direct methods involves paper wise and question wise result analysis, University results, rank holders list, placement and progression. Indirect methods involve participation in cocurricular, extra-curricular and extension activities and sports. College keeps updatig POs & COs on website for larger audience. College has built a congenial atmosphere for teaching and learning.

Research, Innovations and Extension

College demonstrated strong commitment to research and development in last 5 years. College activities are guided by a well-defined Research Policy, implemented through ARC and Research Committee. Students and Staff are encouraged to undertake projects, present papers and engage with agencies. College developed cordial ecosystem for Research though 7 research centers and 15 PG depts. Establishment of IPR Cell, Science Association and IKS Promotion Cell have added an extra edge. As a result, our staff received an amount of Rs. 89,40,450 for research projects from Govt. agencies and published 214 research papers, 55 books, 29 chapters, and 10 papers in proceedings and filed 4 patents. IPR cell undertaken 3 activities. Partnerships established with organizations through 18 MoUs. Our faculty added 10 new plant species to Science. Our research endeavours received endowment of Rs. 26000 from management, alumni and well-wishers, including a fridge and 70 books, which have enriched our library's collection. College has provided facilities worth Rs. 6937087 for research. Our faculty received 12 awards, a testament to their hard work and dedication. We have organized 10 IKS activities benefitting 1074 students, 18 workshops on IPR, Entrepreneurship to support our mission. IKS Promotion Cell has initiated cataloguing of 1900 manuscripts and conducted lecture on 'Art of Translation'. Pradhyapak Prabodhini has organised special lectures on Research Methodology. IQAC has conducted a course on 'Research in Humanities'. Our research students have excelled after completing research, 2 of them have established Start-Ups. These achievements underscore our institution's focus on innovation, research, and collaboration. College has successfully reached out to society and addressed pressing issues through 41 extension activities, including blood donation camps, tree plantation and cleanliness drives, Amhi- Jijau, Savitrichya Leki, health check-up camps, awareness rallies, antitobacco movement, Electoral Literacy and awareness on democracy, gender equity, significance of Millet including orientation of farmers, biodiversity awareness programme. NSS team has shown exceptional sense of responsibility during Covid-19 by stitching and distributing 800 masks in slums and conducted special blood collection drive. It also adapted Anjaneri village for 3 years and helped villagers in Sarul and Rajewadi villages

by donating essential goods including roof bricks.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College is spread over **18 acres of the land** and has **08 buildings**, covering the total **build-up area of 92660.35 sq.feet**. The main building has an administrative block, cabins of officials, examination office and common staff room. The College has 41 classrooms, 4 seminar halls with ICT facilities, science labs, computer labs, a language lab, central instrumentation facility, a reading room, common staff room, and separate toilet blocks for boys, girls and staff. College has Central library having **1.25 lakh books** and **125 journals/periodical/magazines** along with number of departmental libraries. Library has subscribed to N-LIST and other online resources. It has preserved **1900 manuscripts** in ancient scripts like Sanskrit, Brahmi, Sharada and Modi. Special internet enabled computers are made available in library for students. AV Centre of college is equipped with latest gadgets for AV recording. Internet connection with **100 MBPS speed** is made available in department, administrative office and labs. Ramps for physically challenged are built at the entrance of buildings. Facility of lift is made available in some buildings. Volley ball, basket ball courts and indoor badminton court are avaliable for students.

The College premises has **56 species of trees** and 4631 sq. meter area is used for plantation. **Solar Power Plant of 10KW** is installed along with organic compost plant and rain water harvesting. Diesel Generator of 127 V is used for uninterrupted power supply in emergency.

The College has playground, athlete track, basketball court, badminton hall, cricket pitch, sports equipments, gymkhana building, practice room, gym, storage and stage. It also has various facilities for cultural events including garden, open stage, 4 seminar halls with Smartboards, open spaces, sound system, recording studio. College has an updated IT infrastructure including **222 computers for students**, internet connection of 100 MBPS speed and 22 classrooms and seminar halls with ICT facilities such as smart boards, LMS etc. College has **ERP system, canteen, CCTV and Security.**

College's expenditure on infrastructure augmentation and development is **58.66 lakh rupees** (0.76% excluding salary component) and expenditure on infrastructure maintenance is **346.95 lakh rupees** (4.52% excluding salary component) in last five years.

Student Support and Progression

The College has been supporting students by various means like government scholarships, freeships, institutional scholarships, scholarships by NGO's, research and infrastructural facilities. As a result, our students are able to proceed for higher education and get placed in reputed organisations. Scholarship of Rs. 5,72,02,406 in five years benefited 6383 students. Training and placement cell of college organised campus interviews for students. In the last five years, 255 students placed and 762 students progressed for higher education.

The College is committed to the holistic development of its students. It regularly organises a diverse range of capacity development and skill enhancement activities, including soft skills, language and communication skills, yoga, physical fitness, health, ICT skills, competitive exam guidance, and career counselling. Students'

active participation in these activities has proven beneficial in enhancing their skills and employability. Student grievances are resolved through adopting a timely redressal mechanism and implementing statutory guidelines.

The College has maintained high academic standards, with **179 students qualifying** for state, national, and international examinations. Besides academic excellence, students of the College have shown active participation in sports and cultural activities. **1313 students participated** in sports and cultural activities at different levels, bagging **359 awards** in five years, in spite of the lockdown period of 2 years.

The College has formed alumni association informally since 2014. It has raised **Rs. 16,50,353** as registration fee. In addition, College has received generous donations and amount for endowment prizes from alumni. Alumni plays important role in policy making as they are part of CDC, IQAC and management of Gokhale Education Society. The College regularly invites alumni to share their expertise through guest lectures, seminars and cultural events. They also helped in preparing catalogues of manuscripts and worked as expert speakers for add-on and certificate courses. Alumni are invited as chief guest for many programmes. The College magazine feature contributions from alumni. Many departments received support from alumni in various forms including book donations, industry linkages, infrastructure updates and in-kind donations. Department organise alumni meeting to gather valuable suggestions. Alumni counsel our present students informally to prepare for examination and careers.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institutional governance and leadership are directed by College's vision and mission. College's vision is **''Higher Education for All''** focusing on inclusive governance, equal opportunities, and no discrimination. Its mission is to develop critical thinking, inclusiveness, and sensibilities through academic and co-curricular activities, transforming students' lives and creating responsible citizens.

Gokhale Education Society, a parent institution provides resources and infrastructure to the college, while the Principal monitors daily operations. The College follows transparent recruitment & promotion process, and service rules, prioritizing job security and a nurturing environment. IPP guides the College's progress, focusing on student development, infrastructure expansion and staff support. College implements e-governance in administration, Finance and Accounts, Student Admission and Support and Examination with well-defined policy. College has transparent and objective appraisal system for staff as per Govt. norms. It implements numerous measures for staff welfare and encourgement including **Best Emplyoee Awards, Cooperative Society**, financial & medical facilities, ensuring positive and productive work environment. Pradhyapak Prabodhini & IQAC conducted **14 activities** for holistic development of staff. Teachers are provided with financial support for career advancement. **271 teachers** participated in FDP/RC/STC in last 5 years. College collects funds through fees, donations, sponsorships, rent and utilizes its infrastructure for various activities. Donations worth **Rs. 14,90,624** received by College. Internal financial audits are conducted regularly by Ginde & Co. along with govt. audits. Management reviews financial status periodically.

College has got vibrant IQAC that has laid down system for quality maintenance and enhancement. IQAC has made significant strides in areas like Academic Progression, Collaborations and Outreach, planning and deployment of IPP, e-governance, use of ICT, conduct of Audits, ISO, CIE procedure, Assessment Methods & Support, Staff Training, IKS & Research Promotion, NEP preparedness & implementation. It played a key role in disrupted times of Covid-19 by utilizing ICT and reaching out to community. College, through its existence of 100 years and legacy of renowned alumni highlight the efficacy of institutional governance, as well as progressive and proactive management & leadership of Gokhale Education Society. College exemplifies Culture of Excellence with Ethical Foundation standing as lighthouse in education arena of North Maharashtra.

Being a Co-Education HEI, College promotes **Gender Equity** through curriculum, counselling, co-curricular activities and Audits, monitored by **Gender Sensitization and Audit Committee & Vidyarthini Manch**. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	NEP-2020 aims to provide high-quality education to students, equipping them with a strong indigenous foundation to tackle global challenges. Our institution is committed to fostering a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary spirit through its academic and cultural programs, as reflected in our mission statement. To achieve this goal, we encourage students to participate in activities beyond their faculty, department, and subjects. SDB and NSS provide platforms for students to engage in diverse activities. Our annual gathering and Spandan-
	Arts and Science disciplines, with a significant number of science students participating in

Sanskrit/English play performances and vice versa. We promote our students and faculty to complete multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary online courses offered by NPTEL, SWAYAM and ARPIT. 18 of our students have completed such courses in assessment period. Our affiliating university has introduced CBCS for undergraduate and postgraduate programs, allowing students to choose elective courses that align with their interests. Interdisciplinary courses such as 'Modern Indian Languages' and 'Environmental Science' are mandatory for undergraduate classes, while courses like 'Human Rights', 'Communication Skills' and 'Cyber Security' are compulsory credit courses for postgraduate students. PG programme in Journalism & Mass Communication covers topics from history, ethics, economics, political science and languages. College organizes seminars and conferences on themes cutting across disciplinary boundaries, such as the Webinar on NEP-2020 or IKS. The Generic Elective Course, mandatory for TYBA students, covers interdisciplinary topics like social entrepreneurship, digital literacy, and social awareness. Under NEP structure, we offer three subjects from Humanities to first-year Science students and vice versa. Students complete research projects and internships with industry partners as part of the curriculum, addressing society's most pressing issues and challenges. We have designed add-on courses with a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary nature, such as 4-credit course on "Career Advancement", 'Modi Script', 'Introduction to IKS' for final-year BA students. IQAC and Departments collaboratively organize seminars and webinars on implementing NEP-2020. Credit courses like "Introduction to Prakrit," "Research Methodology," "Soap Making," and "Mobile App Making" are conducted for finalyear undergraduate students, covering multidisciplinary aspects. Science departments organise programmes on themes of emotional wellbeing, communication skills, Yog and meditation involving faculty of humanities, whereas humanities students are benefitted by science faculty on issues like disaster management, environmental issues, IT and cyber world and research methodology. Events like LitFest, Ankur, Botanica, Genesis, and the PG Lecture Series expose students to interdisciplinary topics. Our vocational courses in Functional English

	and Travel and Tourism Management (TTM) admit students from various subjects in the Arts stream. We support interaction among students from diverse cultural backgrounds through events like the Socio- Scientific Exhibition, Political Awareness Programme, Democracy Awareness Programme, Bahishal Lecture Series, Documentary Screening, Health Awareness & Check-up Campaign, and the MCEAM Conference. Lectures conducted during NSS winter camps focus on interdisciplinary subjects like health, social responsibility, history of Maharashtra, and developing scientific temperament. Since 2018-2019, our institution has conducted 69 multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary activities, showcasing our commitment to providing a holistic education that prepares students for complex challenges in an interconnected world.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	With the emergence of NEP-2020, the concept of ABC is introduced at college level. There was an elaborate discussion on the provision of ABC in the webinar conducted by the college on NEP and its implementation. The insights gathered from teachers were shared with experts present from the Niti Aayog in the same event. The college is surely preparing for ABC at its level. The students have been notified to register for ABC as per the Savitribai Phule Pune Circulars. Notices were displayed and circulated to create awareness among students, along with teachers counselling in the classrooms. During the induction programmes of UG classes, this concept and registration process is explained in detail to students. Those students who find problems with registration process is guided and helped at the dept. level. In some complex cases, college admin office also extends cooperation. The last year UG students have to register mandatory for ABC as per S. P. University, Pune directives. Accordingly, majority of our college students have registered for the ABC. The students have been notified to register for ABC as per the Savitribai Phule Pune Circulars. Recently, the affiliating university has recently permitted credits transfer.
3. Skill development:	The college prioritizes skill development among students through a comprehensive range of curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. Currently, both soft and hard skill development courses are operational, with mandatory courses such

as 'Communication Skills', 'Information Security', and 'Introduction to Cyber Security' for all postgraduate students. Additionally, UGC-sponsored vocational courses, 'Functional English' and 'Travel and Tourism Management', have been available since 1996 for Arts students, focusing on skill-based learning. They involve project work, internship, on-the-job training, and practical examination. The syllabi of these courses include group discussion, viva-voce, presentations, scrapbook, surveys, interviews, and IT skills. Certificate Courses in French and German provide students with opportunities to enhance their language skills, while activities like 'Earn and Learn' enable students to develop essential skills such as accounts maintenance, typing, gardening, and bookkeeping. All science stream courses are designed to be practical-oriented, emphasizing skills development, particularly in biotechnology and computer science. Courses in Journalism and Mass Communication, as well as Library Science, also focus on skills development. The introduction of the CBCS pattern has led to the inclusion of a Skill Enhancement Course for every subject in the Arts stream at the specialization level for two years. Second-year B.A./B.Sc. students receive orientation on communication skills in English and Marathi, enabling them to acquire skill sets relevant to their subject of specialization. Various skill-oriented activities have been conducted, including soap making courses, language development workshops, expert lectures, and workshops on topics such as laboratory skills, reading-writing skills, and film making. The Mock Parliament event nurtures skills like drafting, presentation, and critical thinking, while departmental events like LitFest, Ankur, Botanica, and Genesis offer opportunities for students to hone their management and social skills. Publications like 'Shraddha', 'Green Minds', 'Susamvad', and 'Sanskrut Patrika' provide unique opportunities for students to improve their writing, editing, and interpersonal skills. Since 2018-2019, the college has conducted 67 activities focused on skills development among students, demonstrating its commitment to fostering a well-rounded and skilled student body. 4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge Since its inception in 1924, the college has been system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using renowned as a hub for languages, offering a diverse

range of linguistic programs. Initially, languages such

online course):

as Parsi, Arabic, Sanskrit, Prakrut, and Ardhamagdhi were taught, and currently, the college offers specialization in Hindi, Marathi, and Sanskrit at the undergraduate level, and in Hindi and Marathi at the postgraduate level. These languages are also offered as general subjects at the undergraduate level. The college promotes the use of Indian languages in instruction, administration, and even in the science stream, and has implemented bilingual teaching methods in the Humanities department. Under the newly introduced Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) pattern, all students in the Arts stream are required to select Hindi or Marathi as part of the Modern Indian Languages (MIL) course. The college also conducts short-term courses in Sanskrit Grammar, Pali Language, and Modi Script, and boasts a rich collection of 4,500 manuscripts in Sanskrit, which are made available to scholars and students. Cultural events at the college regularly feature traditional folk-art forms such as Lavani, Kirtan, Powada, and Koli dance, and all programs commence with Saraswati Vandana or Isha-Stavan and the lighting of the lamp. The college takes pride in celebrating Ganesh Festival and Marathi Bhasha Day, and has organized a lecture series titled "Celebrating Our Tradition," which focuses on topics related to the Indian knowledge system, including "Sanskrit, Sanskar, and Sanskruti," "Life and Works of Dr. P. V. Kane," and "Language and Culture." The college has also created a YouTube series called "Yatharth," which is devoted to Indian culture and is circulated among students. The Sanskrit Department organizes the program "Sanskrit Gangadhara" to celebrate Sanskrit literature, and has conducted webinars on Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS), which have been well-received by students and faculty. A 4-credit course on IKS has been designed and conducted by the college, with the help of alumni, for all undergraduate students. National conferences on "Adivasi Discourse" and "Folk Literature and IKS" have been organized by the Department of Hindi, which have featured IKS in relation to indigenous cultures. Online Sanskrit quiz competitions are also regularly arranged. In line with the National Education Policy (NEP), the college has made a 2-credit course on IKS mandatory for first-year students, which is conducted in offline mode. Faculty from the Sanskrit Department have contributed to

	drafting the IKS syllabus for the affiliating university. The college hosts plays in Marathi, Hindi, and Sanskrit during cultural programs, and celebrates various occasions such as Yog Day, Gurupoornima, Geeta Jayanti, Kalidas Din, Kusumagraj Jayanti, Youth Day, Patrakar Din, Marathi Pandharwada, Hindi Pakhawada, and other activities under the Literary Association. The college has also established a Translation Cell, which aims to nurture translators who can translate Indian knowledge into English and other foreign languages. Plans are underway to digitize manuscripts and make them available to scholars worldwide. Since 2018-2019, the college has made conscious efforts to integrate IKS through 58 activities demonstrating its commitment to promoting Indian knowledge systems and cultural heritage.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The college has embraced OBE as a core principle, aligning with the CBCS. A policy statement on OBE has been developed, and all programs and courses have clearly defined objectives, including POs, and COs. They are prominently displayed on the college website, departmental websites, and communicated to students in the classroom, enabling teachers to plan their teaching and evaluation methods effectively. IQAC coordinates with departments through regular meetings and review mechanisms to ensure that the objectives are met. The attainment of these objectives is assessed through internal evaluations, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, as well as progression and placement of final-year students. Continuous internal assessment helps monitor students' progress towards the defined outcomes, and results are shared with students to create awareness about their final goals. Teachers conduct internal evaluations with the POs/COs in mind, and staff members are oriented on the topic during ISO audits. Student feedback on the syllabus and teaching helps gauge the level of academic interaction, and informal discussions with students by Heads of Departments (HoDs) or mentors ensure that students understand the elementary objectives of their courses. The college administration monitors academic interaction through periodic visits to classrooms and laboratories, and the HoDs, Examination Committee, and College Examination Officer (CEO) ensure the impartial conduct of internal and external examinations. Various cocurricular activities prove helpful for

assessing outcomes of teaching. Surveys on 'Media and Violence', Harantekadi village and Alibag, voters survey before elections helped students practice what they have learned in classrooms. Events like 'LitFest', 'Ankur', 'Botanica', 'Ratufa', 'Science Day', Mehendi, Poetry Reading, Best Personality Competitions held during Annual Cultural Week help students to showcase their academic as well as cultural talents. Avishkar Research Competition offers unique chance to present innovation and research through poster and models. Poster competitions are regularly organised by History, Chemistry, Psychology, Computer Science, Botany, Zoology Departments. Poster Projects are prepared by the students of English Dept. as a part of internal evaluation. 'Dr. Chandubai Kulkarni Elocution Competition' is being organised for last 50 years, offering students an opportunity to critically express as well as prepare them for event organisation. 'Socio-Scientific Exhibition' is a flagship activity of college, bring students from Arts & Science on same platform. Another flagship activity, 'Amhi-Jijau, Savitrichya Leki' not only helps girls students to interact outside the college premises but provide guidance to school-girls. 'Green Minds'; a journal published by Functional English is entirely prepared by students in content, design and financial management is done by students. Science Association provides a unique opportunity to students to practice their learning through 'Door to Door' campaign creating awareness about standardization. Mock Parliament organised by Political Science Dept. helps students to exhibit textual knowledge in real life situations. The curricula of all skill-based courses have been designed with due consideration to micro and macroeconomic and social needs as specified in NEP 2020 and NSQF. College IPP for next 5 years is focusing on this point as well. Since 2018-2019, the college has organised 56 activities/events centered on Outcome based education. The college executes its policy to make optimum utilization of the infrastructure available to facilitate

utilization of the infrastructure available to facilitate all its academic practices. Due to Covid-19 outbreak, the college was largely operational through online mode since March 2020. Right from the conducting lectures and internal examinations of the previous

batch, the college developed online system for inviting applications, display of merit list and final admission. Academic interaction was solely through online platforms like zoom or google meet. Teachers developed e-content and shared it through college website, personal blogs/channels and google classrooms. Internal assessment was also conducted online by using tools like google forms. Vivas and practical examinations were conducted through live online modes. University examination was conducted through dedicated portal. The college went a step ahead and used online modes for hosting webinars, guest lectures and staff meetings. Social media platforms were frequently used for effective communication with students. The college even organised cultural events, various competitions Spandan Festival and Annual Prize distribution function through online modes. Teachers shared the study material on college and university website. Apart from lectures, college produced e-content useful to students while taking admissions or issues faced during lockdowns Even after Covid-19, the college has been making conscious use of online modes for making teaching-learning process more impact making. Majority of extra credit courses are conducted through online modes. Internal assessment is partially conducted online by using tools like google forms. University examination forms are filled through dedicated portal. The college used online modes for hosting webinars, guest lectures. Social media platforms were frequently used for effective communication with students. The college even organised cultural events. Teachers shared the study material on college and university website. The College has formed the ELC as per the guidelines of Election Commission of India. Principal and both Vice-Principals are included in the ELC. Dr. Kailas Sanap is appointed as the Nodal Officer who looks after the functioning of ELC. Students' representative from every class have been included to make it comprehensive and inclusive. ELC, thus, represents the diversity in our College.
3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.	The Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) at our college has been actively organizing impactful activities since its establishment. The Club has been instrumental in raising awareness about the Electoral Process through a variety of engaging initiatives: • Collaborating with the district election administration for a New Voters' Registration Campaign • Hosting rallies to celebrate Voters' Day • Encouraging students to take the Voters' Pledge • Organizing Election Awareness Rallies • Screening short films to educate students about voters' awareness • Providing hands-on experience with Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) to increase voter awareness • Inviting District Election Officers to address students • Offering counselling sessions to students through the ELC • Spreading awareness among villagers of adopted villages with the help of National Service Scheme (NSS) volunteers Over the past two years, the College has successfully conducted nine such activities to enhance Voters' awareness. Efforts have been made to ensure maximum student participation through extensive publicity via notices, social media messages, and classroom interactions.
4. Any socially relevant projects/initiatives taken by College in electoral related issues especially research projects, surveys, awareness drives, creating content, publications highlighting their contribution to advancing democratic values and participation in electoral processes, etc.	College is engaged in creating awareness among students and the community about political processes and elections since 2018. JMC Department has been hosting Political Awareness Programmes since 2014, which provide valuable insights into the election process, code of conduct, campaign strategies, and result analysis. In 2019, the programme took place from April 1st to 4th before the Lok Sabha Election, and from September 16th to 18th before the Maharashtra Assembly Elections. These events

feature district administrative officers, political party spokespersons, journalists, and scholars Additionally, the College has organized a poster exhibition on April 13, 2024, to create awareness among students about the Loksabha Election-2024. The exhibition featured 32 banners/posters prepared by students on topics such as voters' registration process, model code of conduct, EVM & VVPAT handling, facilities at polling stations, elected representatives of Nashik and Malegaon constituencies since 1951, prime ministers of India, and registered political parties in India. The exhibition was visited and appreciated by the Dy. CEO of Nashik Zillah Parishad and leaders of political parties. Students from the Journalism and Political Science departments have also been actively involved in conducting pre-poll surveys. In August 2019, students of the Journalism Department conducted a survey of 700 citizens of Nashik before the Maharashtra Assembly Election. Students of the Political Science Department participated in the electoral survey of the 17th Lok Sabha Elections conducted by CSDS, Delhi from May 1 to 4, 2019, and in the survey conducted by CSDS, Delhi from November 9 to 14, 2020. The College teaches mandatory papers in syllabi, including "Democracy, Election and Governance" for 2 credits, which is mandatory for all students of First Year BA/BSc, and "Introduction to Constitution" of 2 credits, mandatory for all PG courses. The Department of Political Science has designed a special study material for these courses. College has organized a Mock Parliament event on August 27, 2022, and March 19, 2024, to demonstrate the working of parliamentary procedures. Students across the college participated in this event, and prepared new drafts of bills on environment protection and pollution control. This activity was appreciated by citizens of Nashik, and Central Cabinet minister Dr. Bharati Pawar was present as the chief guest on August 27, 2022. Students and Staff interact with villagers of adopted villages by NSS during winter camps about the significance of voting in elections. The College celebrates Constitutional Day and Voters' Day every year, with lectures on Indian Constitution, reading of the Preamble, and presentation of skits. Finally, the faculty of the College is engaged in writing about issues related to democracy, elections, and voting through research papers, newspaper articles, and

	presentations. Some notable publications include Dr. P. S. Deshapnde's "Journey of Local Politics of Nashik" in March 2023, and Dr. A. R. Vasave's "Graph of 1999 Loksabha Elections with special reference to Maharashtra" published in September 2022. Overall, the College has been actively engaged in creating awareness among students and the community about political processes and elections, and has taken various initiatives to promote democratic principles and values.
5. Extent of students above 18 years who are yet to be enrolled as voters in the electoral roll and efforts by ELCs as well as efforts by the College to institutionalize mechanisms to register eligible students as voters.	The College continuously endeavors to create awareness about importance of voting among students. Before the general elections, the College conducts special drives for new voters. As a result, majority of our students are (about 80%) have been registered voters in last five years. To strengthen this activity, the college has taken the following measures. • New voter registration in 2024: The College ensures that the first-year students are aware about voter registration process. Hence, New voter registration Drive is organised on 4 December 2023, 11 March 2024 and 5 & 6 April 2024. before the Lok Sabha Elections in May 2024. 155 students were registered during these drives so far. Family members of students and staff have also joined in during these drives. • Dedicated page on website: The College has created a dedicated page to help students to register as a voter. Information about important sites, Voter Registration App and other relevant information is displayed to facilitate students to register. The College is also planning to make this facility available through the College ERP system in coming time. • Interaction and Counselling: The College provides regular counselling to students about significance of voting and how to register as a voter through during induction programmes, exhibitions, celebration of Constitutional Day and Voters' Day and even through informal interactions. Members of Electoral Literacy Club of College are making a point to interact with students in formal or informal way about the Voter's registration and its impact on democracy.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

College offers learning through 10 departments in the Arts and 11 in Science streams. IQAC planned Curriculum Delivery and Outcome Based Education policies to direct all academic activities. IQAC ensures effective curriculum delivery through Academic Calendar highlighting different curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities including CDC meetings, CIE Schedule, ISO Audit, Annual prize distribution, Celebration of the days. College circulates academic calendar among departments for their inputs. Departments begin term with a meeting for workload assignment, time table and departmental annual planning. Each department plans time-table for teachers, internal exams and student evaluation scheme.

Examination Committee plans schedule for UG and PG internal examination and evaluation. College timely communicates the schedule to students through notice boards and digital platform. Examination Committee conducts the centralized class tests for UG courses. Individual departments plan PG internal examination schedule and the marks are displayed on the notice board of department. College strictly adheres to academic schedule given by affiliating University. In addition to Semester-end exams, departments continuously evaluate the students through class tests, home assignments, viva-voce, open book tests, group discussions and seminars. Teachers evaluate PG students based on presentation skills, analytical skills, subject basics, updated knowledge and language command. Some departments evaluate the students based on the innovative methodologies like research paper presentation.

Teachers are involved as paper setters, evaluators and examiners at College and University. Five teachers worked on BoS involving in syllabus restructuring.

IQAC obtains the feedback on syllabi from various stakeholders and analyse it with an appropriate action by communicating to the respective authorities. ISO and AAA ensures that the documentation and analytical process is updated and up to the mark. Lecture Monitoring Committee ensures the implementation regularly.

Teachers counsel students regarding cross-cutting issues of the courses like Environment, Human values and Professional ethics regularly and also during mentor-mentee meetings. They make students aware of various courses streamed in SWAYAM, MOOC and NPTEL portal.

Gokhale Education Society has built a platform for the college teachers to publish their research articles in a quarterly published journal named '*Swayamprakash*'. College has also offered a stage to publish departmental, students' and individual teacher's views, achievements in an annual magazine '*Shraddha*'. The **Staff Training Academy** of the Society has been active throughout the year in training

the teachers regarding the importance of the ICT and the interdisciplinary approach. College provides outcome-based trainings helping in enhancing students' spiritual, empathetic, social and the adversity quotient. College has been very supportive and pro-active in coordinating the project competitions and poster exhibitions every year for various faculties. Departments specially designed skill-based and interdisciplinary Add-on Courses. Courses of Pali, Prakrut, Brahmi and Modi languages are held periodically and the students are evaluated based on the regular performance.

Response:

CBCS offers wide scope for students. In addition, **28 add-on** and value-added programs offered by College including courses in Wine Technology, Soap Making, Fishery, and Clinical Psychology, and Biochemistry. Journalism and Library Science are professional courses in Arts. Functional English and Travel & Tourism Management are Vocational courses. Credit Courses on 'Personality Development' and 'Research in Humanities' are aimed at developing professional competence. Ability Enhancement Courses at UG level focus on developing competencies suitable to communication skills, critical thinking, problem solving, teamwork and interpersonal skills. As a result, our students are absorbed in the renowned institutes for higher studies, for entrepreneurship and for research-based projects in other countries. Special sessions on 'Preparing for Interviews' expose students to professional skills and ethics.

Humanities courses, especially literature focus on inculcating human values and their rootedness in culture. College has organised lectures, workshops on themes like "Youth and Building New India," "Sanskrit, Sanskar, and Sanskruti," and "Value Education." NSS activities offered real experiences to exhibit value-oriented behaviour to students through blood donation camps, cleanliness drives, awareness programmes. College also organizes like festivals like Ankur, Botanica, Genesis and cultural events like LitFest, Language Days Celebration to foster a sense of culture and social responsibility. *Amhi-Jijau,Savitrichya Leki* activity directly focuses on achieving well-being of school girls through counselling. Our girl volunteers internalise values like compassion, self-realisation through it. Screening of *Yatharth*, YouTube series on Indian culture, celebration of birth anniversaries of eminent persons, Ganesh-Festival, Gurupoornima, Ishastavan & Sarasawati-pujan to begin every function are some key

initiatives.

Environment and sustainable development are addressed through mandatory paper of EVS at UG-level. During field visits, rallies and drives, students are exposed to environmental issues and their solutions. College campus hosts more than 110 trees making it green and refreshing. Research projects in Botany, Geography, Microbiology, Zoology endeavour to solve environmental problems. Documentary made on 'Biodiversity-in-Anjaneri' Botany Dept., Solar-Power-Awareness-Yatra, Tree Plantation by NSS, Development of *Shramachintan*-Garden, Solar-Making-Workshops are key initiatives.

College prioritizes Gender-sensitivity through events like Women's Day celebrations, lectures on 'Yogfor-All, 'Health-Awareness, distribution of saplings to female staff. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

College has established an Examination Committee, led by a CEO, ensuring timely conduct of examinations. As directed by affiliating university, College implemented the CBCS for PG since 2013 and for UG since 2019. Accordingly, internal and external evaluations are weighted at a ratio of 30:70 under the CBCS framework. At the commencement of each semester, a comprehensive calendar for internal assessments is prepared, encompassing unit tests, mid-term and term-end examinations, class tests, oral presentations, projects, and online evaluations. University's Board of Examinations and Evaluation supplies question papers through a secure online delivery system and provides answer sheets and other necessary stationery for end-semester examinations.

Examination and Evaluation Process:

College adheres to a stringent examination and evaluation process, upholding principles of fairness and transparency. University appoints an external senior supervisor and a flying squad; principal nominates an internal senior supervisor. For examinations of second year and onwards, affiliated university conducts a Central Assessment Program. Parallel assessment system is employed within the College for first-year degree students, ensuring consistency and accuracy.

Transparency and Accountability

To facilitate student improvement, the College offers students the opportunity to review their answer sheets for internal exams. Internal examination results are prominently displayed on notice boards, while internal and external examination results are published by the university on its website. The College maintains a transparent grading system, ensuring evaluations are fair and unbiased.

Efficient Mechanism

The College communicates examination procedures to students during induction programs and the principal's opening address. Department heads and committee coordinators also brief students on the examination structure and schedule. Mentor-Mentee system helps to address student queries and concerns. Additionally, the College provides special facilities, including wheelchairs, elevators, and writers, to support students with disabilities. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the College successfully conducted online internal examinations in the 2020-21, while the university also held online external examinations.

Access to Examination Resources

Students have access to previous examination question papers, which are archived in the library and departments, also available online through the university website at http://www.unipune.ac.in/university_files/old_papers.htm. The College provides special examination provisions for students participating in NSS, NCC, sports, and cultural events at university, state, national, and international levels, ensuring they do not miss out on academic opportunities.

Grievance Redressal System

Students can apply online for answer sheet verification and revaluation to University within 10 days of result announcements. If there are any changes in marks after rechecking, University issues new marksheet. A similar process is followed for first-year undergraduate exams by College. Most grievances concerned to hall tickets mistakes, subjects corrections, mark additions, and name corrections, which are promptly addressed. For university exam issues, students are advised to seek help from College office, where staff resolves the issues and communicates with the university via email or in-person if needed. Our College prospectus provides detailed information on the programs and courses available. College webiste and Qviple ERP also assist students about these details.

At the start of each academic year, faculty members meticulously prepare course files that outline the Course Objectives, Course Outcomes, timetable, teaching plans, and credit structure. During the **Induction programmes** and initial Lectures, students are briefed about the syllabus, examination patterns, and expected outcomes of the courses. Special session is reserved during Induction Programmes for Credit Structure and ABC.

The COs and POs are defined by the affiliating university for majority courses and for Add-on/Certificate Courses, the concerned departments formulate them.

During departmental meetings, HoDs collaborate to discuss POs and COs in order to plan cocurricular and extracurricular activities that align with the goals of the department. These outcomes are carefully designed to facilitate thorough and comprehensive learning within our programs and courses, while also ensuring that students acquire the necessary graduate attributes set forth by the institution and university. Following verification by IQAC, the POs, PSOs, and COs for each course are displayed on the College website, departmental display boards, and communicated to students. This transparent approach ensures that students are aware of the learning objectives and expectations associated with their courses, ultimately enhancing their educational experience.

POs and COs play a vital role in shaping the academic panorama of College. By linking POs and COs to academic and extracurricular activities, College provides students with a comprehensive learning experience. This integration enables students to apply theoretical knowledge in real-world settings through projects, internships, and allied activities. Classroom teaching is complemented by field visits, study tours, poster exhibitions, social outreach programmes to fulfil the objectives. As a result, students

develop essential skills, such as problem-solving, teamwork, professional ethics, analytical skills, environmental concerns, awareness about traditions and communication, ultimately achieving the desired programme outcomes and becoming well-rounded individuals.

IQAC plays a vital role in spreading awareness about POs and COs within the College. IQAC disseminates information about POs and COs to faculty members, students, and stakeholders and create awareness to align all academic activities with them. It also orients faculty members to help them understand the importance of POs and COs and their implementation. Through BOS members, suggestions and feedback is conveyed to University. Through its efforts, IQAC endeavours to focus on Outcome based Education by creating and facilitating the effective implementation and achievement of POs and COs.

Response:

College has defined a policy for mapping the attainment of POs and COs as that will be a true barometer of College's endeavours to practice Outcome Based Evaluation (OBE) which is a thrust area for NEP-2020 as well. The Policy emphasises on Awareness, Mapping, Assessment & Evaluation and Review & Revision. College measures the POs-COs attainment through two methods;

Direct Method
 In-direct Method

Direct Method

This method uses performance of students in various examinations and analysis of result as the base for mapping. It involves analysing the results of internal & external examinations and mapping them directly to the course outcomes. The method contains 4 dimensions.

1. **Analysis of Results- Paper-wise**: In this type of mapping, overall marks of students in internal and University examination of the last semester are analysed by using the statistical formula. Some sample papers are selected for this purpose. The attainment is mapped depending on the marks obtained by students. This method gives overall performance of students in terms of internal assessment (having many small tests) and University results that cover the entire syllabus.

- 2. Analysis of Results- Question-wise: It concentrates only on Internal Evaluation monitored by subject-teachers. It uses random sampling and marks of internal assessment are analysed by questions. Teachers take care to set question paper or design assessment components in accordance with COs. The performance of students for every question or component is directly linked with attainment of each CO. Observations and ATRs are conveyed to teachers for further action.
- 1. **Overall Result of College:** IQAC collects result analysis from every dept for their respective courses every year. The overall result of College as per the Programmes (BA, BSc, MA, MSc, B. Lib, M. Lib) is prepared by compilation as well as on the basis of ledgers received from the University. The percentage of result is calculated for every programme per year. This method is indicative of the comprehensive performance of students, giving indication of attainment of POs-COs in totality along with earlier two methods.
- 1. **Rank Holders in University List:** Savitribai Phule Pune University is among top 3 universities in Maharashtra in terms of affiliated colleges (705) and number of students enrolled (2.81 lakhs approx.) Every year, University publishes Rank Holders' List after results. Featuring in this list is an honour in itself for students. **88 students of our College** featured in this list in last 5 years, which is an indication of highest attainment of POs-COs.
- 1. **Progression and Placement:** mapping of outcomes is done through students' placement and progression for higher education.

'**Research Tools**' workshop of Zoology Dept. introduced participants to essential tools for effective and efficient research. This session highlighted software applications for data analysis, reference management, and collaborative work. This practical session enhanced their research productivity. **IOT workshop** (**Electronics**) delved into the interconnected world of smart devices and their multifaceted applications across various sectors. Workshop on **Hands-On Training on Soap Making Techniques**, by Chemistry Department, oriented on the chemical processes, safety protocols,

soap formulations, blending creativity.

The event, Advanced Electronic Technologies: Career Opportunities and Atmanirbhar Bharat explored career opportunities by discussing latest technological advancements, industry demands, and role of innovation in achieving self-reliance.

Workshop on **Data Presentation and Analysis in LIS Research** enhanced the clarity and impact of research outputs. It covered statistical methods, data visualization tools, and best practices for presenting research findings, with the skills necessary for effective data presentation and analysis.

Seminar on **Research Strategy in Humanities and Social Science** offered an overview of research strategies tailored to these fields. Topics discussed included theoretical frameworks, ethical considerations, and interdisciplinary approaches. Participants engaged in discussions on case studies and developed strategies for their research projects, fostering a collaborative and insightful learning environment.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1

Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Response:

College promotes its extension and outreach programmes by making students participate in various activities through NSS, NCC, IQAC, Vidyarthini Manch and various departments of the College.

During assessment period, **04 NSS Special** camps were arranged in neighbourhood villages. NSS Volunteers carried out small construction works, tree plantation, cleanliness drives and awareness programmes in Sarul, Rajewadi and Anjaneri villages. **Donation of 6000 for roof tiles** were given to Rajewadi village.

Rally and survey on social issues i.e. Eye donation, cleanliness, food safety, AIDS awareness organised by NSS & NCC. Free health checkups for students and residents of adapted villages were conducted. Students participated in events like **plastic free campaign**, **Spit free India Movement**, **Harit Wari-Swachh Wari**, sensitizing citizens about pressing social issues.

NSS dept. specially organised **Sanitation and Vaccination** campaign during Covid-19. Our volunteers stitched and distributed **800 masks in slums**. Staff members and students of Microbiology actively participated in testing and analysis of patient samples. **Biotechnology department** actively participated in RT-PCR check-ups during COVID. NSS volunteers also participated as **COVID Warrior**.

Tree plantation drive and leanliness drives conducted at Harishchandra fort, Karanjwan dam,Godavari river banks and surrounding areas. The same drives are also conducted regularly on campus.

779 students participated in total 8 Blood donation camps and total 272 litter blood collected.

BIS door to door campaign fetched sponsorship from BIS. This enabled **72 students** to create awareness about using standardization in daily life. They visited **1800 citizens** during this campaign.

Celebrating **Constitution Day** and **Mock Parliament** highlighted the importance of understanding constitutional rights and duties, aiming to educate citizens about the principles enshrined in the Indian Constitution. **Organisation of Lokshahi Pandarwada** further emphasized democratic values and public participation in governance. Special programs were arranged to create awareness on Election and voting. Some events like Ankur, Botanica, LitFest Festivals, Socio-Scientific Exhibition and Poster exhibitions were visited by localites.

Under Amhi-Jijau, Savitrichya Leki activity, 17 PG students of College counselled 630 school girls of 09 schools in Nasik city on topics like health and hygiene, mobile addiction, career counselling, peer pressure etc.

Political Science department organized Gandhi Sanskar Examination and History Dept. organised Webinar on 'Gandhian Ideology' to promote spirit of unity and tolerance.

College successfully organised **Sunday Science Activity** offering first hand experience to students of all kinds. These activities include demonstrations, science exhibition and Solar Lamp making workshop in tribal areas. **Botany department**, to commemorate International Millet year conducted **Millet**

exhibitions at Nagar, Mokhada, Wadia colleges. Farmers as well students got benefitted by the experts' advice. **Psychology department** has implemented Psychoeducation module at Anand Niketan School to develop emotional literacy and enhanced psychological well-being of school going children.

Outcome: **Over 1500 students, 10 schools, 6 villages** and large number of citizens have been benefitted due to these initiatives, reflecting a comprehensive approach to community service, encompassing health, environmental sustainability, education, emotional well-being and cultural awareness. Response:

Our College is spread over approx. **18 acres of the land**. It is at the centre of Nashik city and has 08 buildings covering 92660.35 sqf. College has three entry gates and separate parking lots for girls, boys and staff. They are monitored by CCTV. Security guards are positioned throughout the campus for 24 hours. Main College building has an administrative block, cabins of officials, examination office and common staff room. The College has 41 classrooms, 4 seminar halls with smart boards, science labs, computer labs, a language lab, central instrumentation facility, a reading room, common staff room, separate toilet blocks for boys, girls and staff. All laboratories are equipped with fire extinguishers, which are annually recharged and maintained. College has Central library having **1.25 lakh books and 125 journals** along with number of departmental libraries. Library Manager software is used at library and majority work is automated. Separate section for periodicals, references books and competitive examination books is maintained. Video Centre of college is equipped with latest gadgets for AV recording. Internet connection with 100 MBPS speed is made available in each department, administrative office and labs. Ramps for physically challenged are built at the entrance of buildings. Xerox Centre, Drinking Water coolers, power generator are available. The college also provides canteen facility for students and staff on the campus at reasonable rates.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The College has Central library housing 1.25 lakh books and 125 journals along with number of departmental libraries. The library houses 214 rare books published during 1859-1937 and 1905 old and rare Sanskrit manuscripts.

Library Manager 2.0, an integrated Library Management Software has been installed in library for doing all house-keeping Library functions. The software was developed and marketed by Pollengrain Software, Pune. This LMS software is capable of handling large records. It has password control, allocation of 'read only' access along with cost-effectiveness and is user-friendly. The LMS supports the following library activities:

Acquisitions

Cataloguing

Circulation of books

OPAC

It integrates bar-code system that can be printed by using book accession number. It generates numerous reports; Accession register, Publication Subject, Shelf-list report, Title wise, Author wise, Accession number wise, Subject wise and category wise, It can be used for charging and discharging of books, renewal of books, overdue books and calculation of fine. Daily issue and return statistics can also be generated. Library statistics includes total number of members, books in circulation to the teaching faculty and the students. OPAC facility enables searching catalogue using Basic and Advanced Search Facility. Duplicate checking of books is done easily. LMS also offers Dead Stock verification facility. Inventory includes total books available in the library, missing issues etc. Special data protection features that is saving the data up-to last record entered in case of power failure. The College library has also framed a weed-out policy for discarding books.

The library is member of NLIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) through NLIST students and staff members can access e-journals, e-books, databases and e-ShodhSindhu resources. The library also has a separate Braille library setup.

Staff common room, library, administrative office, Geography, Psychology, Physics, English, Zoology, Hindi, Computer Science, Gymkhana and Post graduate Department of Chemistry is enabled with Wi-Fi. Up-gradation of ICT is carried out from time to time. Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) for the upkeep of hardware and software is in place and the problems, if any, are addressed immediately.
